# **Pride Month**

#### 1<sup>st</sup> June marks the start of Pride Month.

Taking place each June, Pride Month is an annual celebration of inclusivity and the LGBTQ+ community.

The month-long event is seen as an opportunity for people to come together and celebrate positivity, love and friendship.

Pride Month is a chance to promote equal rights for all. It's also a time to think about what still needs to be done so that everyone is treated fairly.

#### Why is Pride Month in June?

- Pride Month is celebrated in June to mark the anniversary of the Stonewall riots which happened in 1969.
- These riots took place in New York between the police and members of the LGBTQ+ community. In response to violent police raids and discrimination against them, members of the community fought back and it started six days of protests.
- These events are thought to have started the LGBTQ+ movement.

A Pride parade took place in New York one year after the Stonewall riots. It's thought to be America's first Pride parade. Two years later, the first London Pride parade took place.

In that first year, a few hundred people marched from Hyde Park to Trafalgar Square.

This year, more than 30,000 people will join the parade while around one and a half million people watch on.

Parades will take place in other UK cities over the next few weeks too, such as Edinburgh, Cardiff, York and Bristol.

Although Pride parades had been taking place since the 1970s, it wasn't until 1999 that US President Bill Clinton declared June to be Pride Month.

Probably the most famous symbol associated with the month is the rainbow flag.

The rainbow flag has six stripes - red, orange, yellow, green, blue and violet. Each stripe stands

for something different.

Red for life, orange for healing, yellow for sunlight, green for nature, blue for peace and violet for spirit.

During June, many famous places and landmarks can be seen decorated or lit up with the

colours of the rainbow flag.

So, keep an eye out and see how many of these symbols of equality and inclusivity you can spot in the coming weeks!

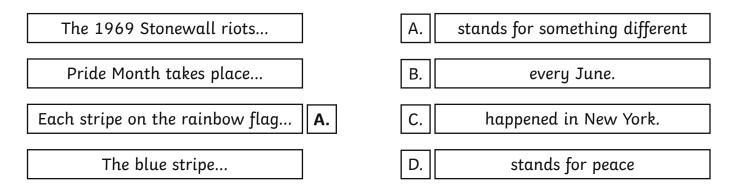
